Other species planted in the wet areas of the frog habitat:

- Common Reed
- Tall Spikerush
- Vetiver grass

All trees (except the Silky Oak) are species of Eucalyptus that are endemic to the North West region of NSW. A wide diversity of native plants have been selected to build a healthy ecosystem, with many of the plant species known to attract bees, birds, butterflies and other insects.

Frogs, reptiles and small mammals will also benefit from the native vegetation.
